

Something You Don't Know (Tsukiji)

- 1. Opened on 11 February 1935 to replace a market that was destroyed² in the 1923 earthquake.
- 2. \$8 billion of seafood is bought here every year. That's \$22,000,000 per day.
- 3. Edo originally had a fish market at Nihonbashi. Shogun Ieyasu Tokugawa set up the market to sell fish that the people in Edo Castle couldn't eat. In 1923, the Great Kanto Earthquake destroyed much of Tokyo and the Nihonbashi market with it. The government took that as an opportunity³ to move the market, which was unsanitary⁴, to Tsukiji.
- 4. In 2013, sushi chain owner Kiyoshi Kimura paid \$1.76 million for a Bluefin tuna at the traditional New Year bidding war⁵. It is a publicity stunt⁶ for his business.
- 5. 1,630 tons of seafood are sold every day.

Tsukiji Market Closes and Toyosu Market Opens

I'm sure you have been following this story on the news and it's not "news" for you, but, this week, the Tsukiji fish market finally closed and all of the shops and fish sellers moved to the new Toyosu building which is about 2km away. The governor⁷ of Tokyo, Yuriko Koike, green-lighted⁸ the project back in 2016 after a long delay. The new site is a converted gas plant and is much bigger, brighter and cleaner.





Tsukiji was opened in 1935. It began as a fish market but slowly grew into a major tourist attraction. If you got there early enough, at about 4 or 5 am, you could see the catch of the day being delivered by the fishing boats and you could watch the fish auctions. All of the famous restaurants in Tokyo, and many across Japan, would get there to be first to bid on the best fish. After that tourists would come to eat sushi and sashimi.

Around the main market were many small restaurants that served the tourists with fresh fish caught that day. However, Tsukiji was cramped⁹ and dirty. Rats roamed the alleys. The new place is open and cleaner. It might take the people that have worked at Tsukiji all their life time to get used to the change, but it is for the best.

The Tokyo government predicts that there will be an infestation¹⁰ of rats in Tokyo now Tsukiji has been closed.


World Records


