

- 3. The most expensive comic is Action Comics Number 1. It was published in 1938 and has the first ever Superman story. A pristine³ copy will see for over \$1 million.

Stan Lee Dies

I'm sorry that I have done death for two weeks in a row⁵ now, but I thought this might be one that you are all interested in. Maybe you don't know who Stan Lee is, but you definitely know some of the characters he created, or you have seen them in movies. Starting in the 1960s he invented Spiderman, Hulk, Doctor Strange, the Fantastic Four, Daredevil, Black Panther, the X-Men, Ant-Man, Iron Man and Thor.





Stan Lee died last Monday, at the age of 95. He had been ill for a while. He possibly became more famous over the last ten years because he always had a cameo⁶ in every Marvel movie that was made. Now you know what he looks like, go back, watch them again and see if you can see him. He is there. He started working for Marvel in 1939, before it was even called Marvel. He worked there, or was connected to them, until his death.

Lee's wife of 69 years died in 2017, and his health, which had been suffering for a while, started to deteriorate⁷.

The characters that he has created have earned over \$100 billion dollars, but that money didn't go to Stan Lee because he was just a company employee at Marvel when he created them. He didn't own the rights⁸ to the characters. He always said that that didn't bother⁹ him and he didn't need billions to be happy.




