


Something Interesting (Amazon)

1. Jeff Bezos started Amazon in 1994. He started by selling books.
2. He thought about calling his company "relentless"³ but realized that the word has a negative image. If you type relentless.com into your internet browser, you will go to Amazon.com.
3. Amazon employs 1 million people and delivers to about 1.5 billion people. This number will probably increase yearly.
4. A large part of Amazon's profits⁴ don't come from retail⁵. The company has an online cloud computing service. AWS (Amazon Web Services) made 63% of the company's profits. Amazon sees the retail industry as limited and wants to branch out⁶ into other areas.
5. In America, and probably Japan too, 50% of every dollar spent online is spent at Amazon.
6. Amazon is partly responsible for a huge shortage of cardboard this year.

Jeff Bezos Steps Down As Amazon CEO

Jeff Bezos has decided to step down from his position as Amazon CEO⁷. He is not quitting the company entirely because he will still stay on as the executive chairman⁸. The difference is, he will no longer be in charge of the day to day running⁹ of the company. As executive chairman, he will still have a lot of say over what happens to the company, but he will have a lot more time to work on his other interests. His other passions are his Blue Origin space venture¹⁰ company, the Washington Post newspaper, and the several




environmental organizations he has started. Many people have criticized¹¹ Jeff Bezos for not doing more to help people with his money. He is currently the world's richest man and is worth 20,600,000,000,000 yen. Now that he will have more time, I think he intends to help more people and to help the planet. In American dollars, he is worth 196 billion. His fortune increased by about 20% in 2020 because of the corona virus pandemic.

Many countries used lockdowns and made people work from home. This meant that they couldn't go shopping and they used online stores more often. The most common online store is, of course, Amazon. Most of Jeff Bezos' money comes from stock¹² he holds in Amazon so, more money for Amazon means more money for Jeff. There is some speculation¹³ that Jeff Bezos will one day be the world's first trillionaire¹⁴. He is rich, but that is still a long way off.

World Records

He started at the source⁴ in the mountains of Peru and walked all along the river until it ended in the Atlantic Ocean. It took him 860 days. Something interesting

I'm writing about Amazon's boss, Jeff Bezos, this week, so I thought I'd write about the Amazon river. The Amazon is said to be the world's second longest river and the Nile the first. There is some argument⁵ about where the source of each river is, but the Nile is about 200km longer. The Amazon is 6,400km long. The Amazon might be shorter, but it has more water. The Nile flows⁶ at 300 million m³ per day, but the Amazon flows at about 18 billion m³! That is hard to imagine. Basically, it is larger than the next 7 longest rivers combined. 20% of all freshwater⁷ that flows into the oceans comes from the Amazon!

The river flows through nine South American countries and completely crosses the continent. It flows through the Amazon rainforest, which is the home of about 30% of all the species⁸ on Earth.

Despite it being so long and going through so many countries, there are no bridges over the river. Because of the thick jungle, no major cities have been built close to the river. If you need to cross the river for any reason, you will have to swim across or get a boat.

The Amazon river and the Amazon rainforest are under threat⁹ more now than ever before. The president of Brazil has relaxed laws¹⁰ on clearing the forest and about 17% of the forest has been destroyed so far. People sell the wood from the trees and then use a lot of the land to raise cows on. Often, when you eat meat in a burger or at a restaurant, it has been raised in the Amazon rainforest. Cutting down on how much meat we eat is one thing we can do to help.
