

### Something You Don't Know (The Nobel Prize)

- 1. 1. There were 5 prizes originally. Physics<sup>3</sup> chemistry<sup>4</sup>, peace, medicine<sup>5</sup> and literature<sup>6</sup>. A prize in economics<sup>7</sup> was added in 1968 making 7 categories.
- 2. 2. The prize was created by Alfred Nobel who was an armaments manufacturer<sup>8</sup>. He is also famous for inventing dynamite. He didn't want to be remembered for arms, so he created the Nobel Prizes in his will. He left 94% of his fortune, \$186,000,000 to start the prize fund.
- 3. 3. America has won the most Nobel Prizes. They have won 324 out of the 561 prizes.
- 4. 4. Two people have refused to accept the prize: Jean-Paul Satre and Le Duc Tho.
- 5. 5. Four people have won two prizes: Marie Curie, Linus Pauling, John Bardeen and Fred Sanger.
- 6. 6. Lawrence Bragg was 25 years old when he won the Nobel Prize for physics in 1915!


### Announcements

#### **Donna Strickland Wins Nobel Prize for Physics**


Donna Strickland, a physicist from Canada has won the Nobel Prize for physics. She, and her two colleagues, won the award for their work on pulse lasers<sup>9</sup>. Ms. Strickland is the first female winner of the physics prize since 1963, 55 years ago. In fact, of all the 923 science Nobel Prizes that have been awarded, women have only won 50 of them. Ms. Strickland hopes that this will encourage more girls to study science.





Their discovery made it possible for lasers to be more powerful, and also for the creation of laser tweezers which are used to hold microscopic organisms<sup>10</sup> such as virus or bacteria. They have shared a prize of \$1 million. Ms. Strickland is only the third ever woman to win the prize for physics. The other two were Marie Curie in 1903 for her work on radioactivity<sup>11</sup> and Maria Goeppert-Meyer for her work on atomic structure<sup>12</sup>.

Donna Strickland didn't even have a Wikipedia page until a few days ago. Somebody tried to create one for her, but their request was cancelled. Wikipedia said that Ms. Strickland was not notable or famous enough to need a page. Then she won the Nobel prize. She has a page now. Hopefully a lot of girls (all of you) will be encouraged by her story and will start to learn sciences. I think the next Nobel prize for physics winner is reading this news right now!







#### **World Records**


### **An Interesting Sport**
