### Something You Didn't Know (Saturn<sup>3</sup>)

1. Saturn is a gas giant. That means it is a spinning ball of gas. In the center of the planet, where the pressure is the greatest, the hydrogen<sup>4</sup> that the planet is mostly made of could become metallic hydrogen and it is possible that the planet has a rock core, but it's impossible to tell.
2. Saturn has 62 moons. Some of them have collided<sup>5</sup> in the past and made the famous rings.
3. Saturn spins very quickly and a day only lasts 10 hours and 32 minutes.
4. Most of Saturn's rings are only about 10m thick. They stretch out over 120,000km from the planet. That is about half the distance from Earth to the Moon.
5. Saturn is very windy, just like Jupiter. Some of the winds can reach up to 2,000km/h. The strongest winds ever registered on Earth were 408km/h.

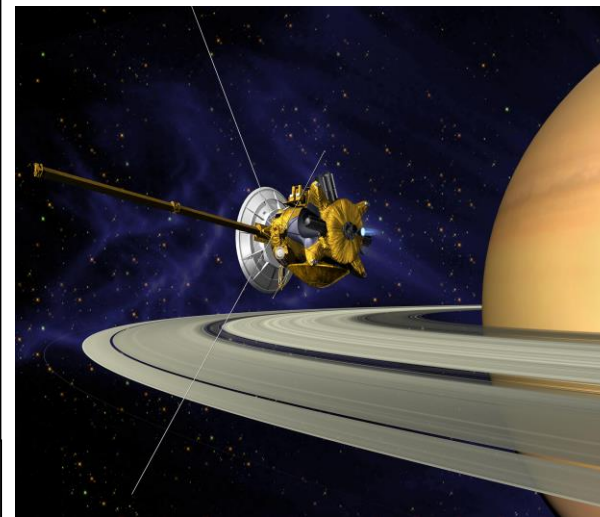
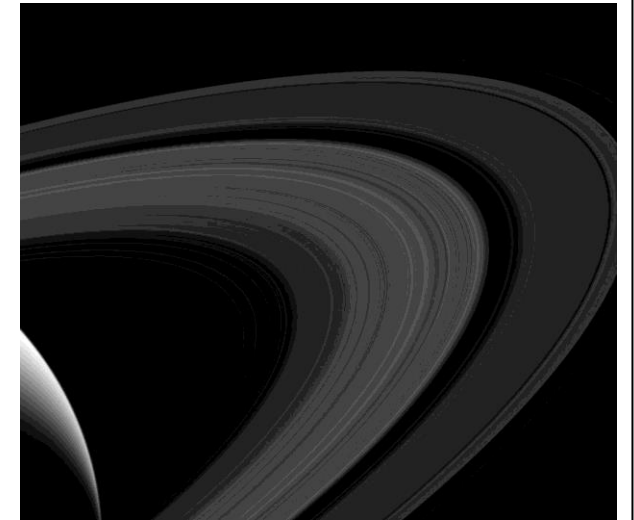

### Saturn's Rings Younger Than Expected

Last week, NASA's Cassini Spacecraft sent back lots of data about Saturn. The spacecraft was on a mission to test Saturn's rings before diving to the planet. The scientists at NASA have learned a lot more about Saturn and its rings than they ever knew before. Scientists thought that the rings developed with the planet and were about 4 or so billion years old. However, the probe has found information that disputes<sup>6</sup> this idea.



Cassini was launched 20 years ago and it has been flying steadily<sup>7</sup>. It finally reached Saturn, which is 1.2 billion KM from Earth, a few weeks ago and has been diving through the rings. It will finish its mission in April and will take a suicide dive into Saturn's atmosphere. When it travelled through the rings, which are made of ice, dust and small rocks, the probe discovered that they were far younger than previously thought.

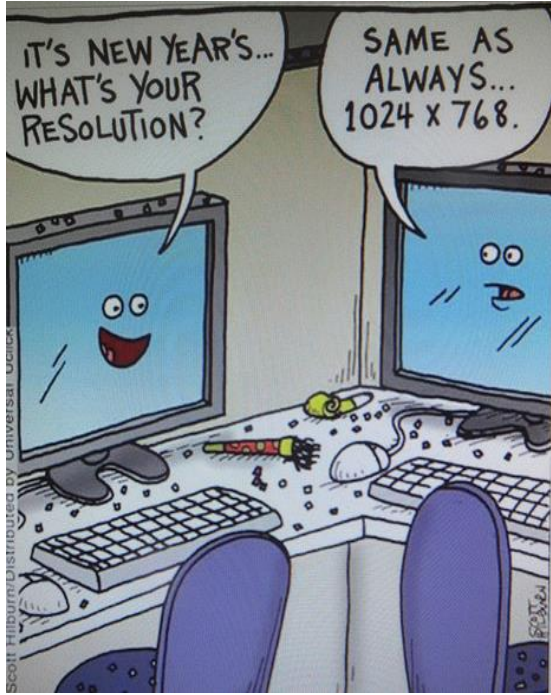
The scientists worked out the mass<sup>8</sup> of the rings and they worked out how much of the rings was falling to the planet each year. From that, they could calculate how old the rings were. They calculated that they are only 100 million years old. That means Saturn has spent 4.9 billion years without rings. That means, if the dinosaurs had been able to use a telescope, they wouldn't have seen rings around Saturn. Also, they discovered the rings will disappear in another 100 million years.
