




### Something You Didn't Know (Cardboard<sup>1</sup>)

- 1. Corrugated<sup>2</sup> cardboard was invented in the UK in 1856 and was used as a liner for top hats<sup>3</sup>.
- 2. In 1871, in New York, cardboard was first used for shipping.
- 3. The prefabricated<sup>4</sup> cardboard box was invented by accident in 1890. A man in Scotland was making paper bags. Something in his machine slipped and started folding and cutting the bags. He realized he could use it to manufacture easy to assemble cardboard boxes.
- 4. In the 1950s, the box became popular because it could be used to ship fruit without bruising<sup>5</sup>. This helped producers make more money and export internationally.
- 5. Amazon in America uses about 35 million tons of cardboard per year.
- 6. 90% of cardboard is recycled, compared with only about 22% of paper.

### Price Of Drinks To Go Up 20 Yen

Most of the major bottling companies in Japan announced last week that they are going to raise the price of their drink bottles by 20 yen over the next few months. Suntory and Coca Cola probably own the most types of drinks in Japan, so the price hike<sup>6</sup> will affect all of us. The reason for the price change is the rising price of cardboard. Apparently, the price of cardboard has risen from 55 yen per 1m<sup>2</sup> to 62 yen, causing a fall in their profits<sup>7</sup>.



However, this figure is not 100%. A lot of cardboard is still wasted. The bottling industry could try to transition to reusable<sup>10</sup> containers to ship their drinks in, but then you have the added costs of collecting and cleaning the containers. Plus, cardboard is very easy to store in a warehouse. Maybe one of you will be the one to solve this problem. I think, some kind of light, collapsible<sup>11</sup> plastic or metal case is the obvious way to go. Which one of you is going to invent it?



I'm not the best mathematician in the world, but I'm pretty sure a price rise of 55 yen to 62 yen is only 7 yen. This doesn't explain, to me, why they are raising the price of their drinks by 20 yen. I'm sure they have their reasons. They have to look out for their bottom line<sup>8</sup>. Coca cola and the other drink companies use a staggering<sup>9</sup> amount of cardboard to package and ship their drinks. Thanks to recycling programs, a lot is reused.


