## Something you didn't know about passwords:

## A building

This week let's look at St. Basil's Cathedral. It is probably the most famous building in Russia. Many people think it is called the Kremlin, but the Kremlin is a government building<sup>1</sup> and a fortified complex<sup>2</sup>. St. Basil's cathedral<sup>3</sup>, the Kremlin, and several other buildings are inside an area called Red Square. St. Basil's Cathedral was built in 1561 by Ivan the Terrible. It was commissioned<sup>4</sup> by his father, Ivan the Great, the first Tsar of Russia. He ordered it to be built to commemorate<sup>5</sup> his victory<sup>6</sup> over the khanates<sup>7</sup> of Kazan and Astrakahn, which made him the ruler of a unified<sup>8</sup> Russia. The building is most famous for its beautiful colors, but when it was built, the cathedral was white. The building was painted in its amazing colors in the 17<sup>th</sup> century. When Stalin came to power, he wanted to destroy the cathedral. He wanted more space in the square for marches and demonstrations. Luckily, he changed his mind. The design of the building is almost Arabic, and it is unique in Russia. Nobody really knows why the architect<sup>9</sup> chose such a design.
