Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee

Last week, Queen Elizabeth II of Britain, celebrated her Platinum Jubilee⁸. That means she has been on the throne for 70 years! She became Queen on the death of her father, George VI, on February 6, 1952. She is the longest living reigning monarch. There were four days of celebrations for her in the UK, but she is having mobility⁹ problems and didn't appear in all of them She is 95 years old now and she cannot walk as easily as she used to. She is being replaced in a lot of the ceremonies by her son Charles, the Prince of Wales. Some people think that this may be a sign that the queen is thinking of abdicating, but she has always said that she will continue until she dies.

There are going to be parades and a flyby by the Red Arrows, which is the British version of the Blue Impulse. Community beacons¹⁰ are going to be lit across the country. Beacons were a system of warning about an invasion¹¹ in years gone by, but this year, they are being used in celebration. The first beacon will be lit in front of Buckingham Palace. There will be many parties, and a final ceremony. Ed Sheeran and a choir of famous British singers are going to finish the ceremony by singing the national anthem. It is going to be an amazing performance. Apparently, the queen will watch it on TV. The next jubilee will be in five years, when the queen turns 100!

<u>A building</u>

This week let's have a look at the Lotus Temple in New Delhi, India. It was opened in 1986 and is obviously called the Lotus Temple because it looks like a lotus⁵. It is a temple for the Bahá'i faith⁶. The Bahá'i faith is very interesting. It teaches that all religions have equal worth⁷, and that the unity⁸ of people is important. In Bahá'i temples, anybody with any religion can come and worship. It is a place of peace and respect. The faith says that there is one god who speaks to different people through different gods. The faith

started in Iran in the 1840s.

All Bahá'l temples have to have similar things. They all have to have a nine-sided circular shape. They have to have a dome. There cannot be any pictures, statues, or images inside the temple. There also cannot be altars⁹ or pulpits¹⁰.

The Lotus Temple has 27



free-standing¹¹ marble petals. They are arranged into nine groups of three to give the nine sides. The temple has nine doors, and the inside of the dome is 34 meters high. There are also nine ponds and nine gardens around the temple. 2,500 people can fit inside the temple. The temple is a point of worship for many different people, but it is also a tourist destination. Since it



was built, over 100 million people have visited it. That is a lot of people! Also, interestingly, it is the first temple in India to use solar power. I would love to go and visit this one day. It must be a very impressive building.
