Something you didn't know about gold:

- 1. Gold is expensive because it is very rare. Only 188,000 tons of gold have been mined⁴ worldwide since gold mining began. For comparison⁵, 900 million tons of iron are mined every year.
- 2. Gold is a very conductive⁶ metal. That means, if you wear gold jewelry, it very quickly warms up to body temperature and feels warm.
- 3. The US Federal Reserve holds 6,700 tons of gold. Almost 5,000 tons of that is in Fort Knox. That much gold is worth about \$7 trillion.
- 4. Gold is not the rarest and most valuable metal. That is rhodium. It is worth two times more than gold.

Giant Gold Nugget

An amateur gold digger in Australia has found a gold nugget⁷ worth \$160,000. The gold digger was a hobbiest. He was using a cheap metal detector and prospecting⁸ in an area of Australia known as the "Golden Triangle". This was where Australia had a gold rush in the 1800s. The man found the top of a rock and pulled it out of the ground, thinking it might have a little bit of gold inside it. When he broke it open, he found that it contained 2.4kg of gold! At today's gold prices, that comes to about \$160,000! He had it valued at a gold shop called Lucky Strike Gold and they bought it off him straight away. I wonder if he will keep prospecting because his nugget is big but it isn't the biggest ever

found. That also came from Australia and it weighed 66 kg. It was found in 1869, but if it had been found today it would be worth about \$2 million. Have you ever tried gold prospecting? There are rivers near Sapporo where people sometimes find gold, but not as much as this man.

An invention

This year, I am going to look at an invention every week. Let's start with the electric kettle. Do you use one? The electric hot water pots we have in Japan are a little different to the electric kettle that I grew up with. I am talking about a kettle you fill with water, press a button, and let it boil. The electric kettle was invented in 1891 in America. It was similar to a modern kettle, but it took 10 minutes to boil the water. The whistling⁶ kettle was invented in 1915. When the water had boiled, the steam made the kettle whistle to tell people it was ready. The main problem with the electric kettle was of the electric supply to houses, people didn't have an electric outlet and had to plug⁷ devices into their light sockets. They had to unscrew the lightbulb

and plug in the device. By 1930. about 70% of houses in America had electricity. It took longer to get electricity to rural⁸ areas. It took a lot longer before people had enough power and enough electrical outlets to use things like electric kettles. Many people still boiled water over their oven or on a hot stove and didn't think an electric kettle was necessary⁹. Last year, 6.3 million electric kettles were sold in the USA, so people think they are



necessary now.
