## Something you didn't know about the Library

- 1. The oldest library was started in 668 BC by Ashurbanipal, King of the Assyrians. He had 30,000 clay<sup>3</sup> tablets that people could read.
- 2. The biggest library in the world is the Library of Congress in America. It has over 39 million books and 167 million items altogether! The library has 1,349 km of shelves.
- 3. The first bookmobile was introduced in the UK in 1857. It was a library pulled behind a horse and was used to take books into rural<sup>4</sup> communities.
- 4. Libraries used to be kept warm with coal-fired stoves⁵. Most libraries were built with an apartment above them so that the librarian could shovel coal whenever anybody wanted to use the library.

## **The Library of Things**

There is a new trend spreading around the world. It is called the Library of Things. I'm sure that you have used a library at some time in your life, even if it is just our library at school. What did you borrow? Books? Magazines? A newspaper? The Library of Things is an idea that is based on a

real library, but you borrow things and not books. Do you like DIY? I do. Have you bought an expensive electric tool<sup>6</sup> that you have only used twice? I have. Well, one reason for the Library of Things is
