

- 1. The first food bank was made in 1967 by John van Hengel in Phoenix, USA. He was trying to stop food waste and didn't realize how important it would be at the time.
- 2. Most cities in developed countries<sup>2</sup> have food banks, but there are not enough in poorer countries. There are many charities that are trying to set them up.
- 3. Food banks in Japan started quite recently. There are only 230 at the moment, but there are more every year.
- 4. The number of people visiting food banks skyrocketed<sup>3</sup> after the corona virus. The cost of living crisis<sup>4</sup> is also making it very difficult for a lot of people to make ends meet<sup>5</sup>. Many people need help.

## **Free Grocery Store**

Canada has opened its first free grocery store. It is in Regina, Canada. The grocery<sup>6</sup> store is open from 9 to 5, for five days a week. Why is it free? The grocery store is operated<sup>7</sup> by the Regina Food Bank and all of the food has been donated<sup>8</sup> by people



or local supermarkets and businesses. All of the items in the grocery store are free for anyone who needs them, and it is set up like a regular store so the customers can use a shopping cart and choose what they need. People can visit the store once every two weeks. The store was set up by the local food bank because they realized a few things. Firstly, visiting an food bank is very embarrassing<sup>9</sup> for people. When it is set up like a store, there is a lot less shame<sup>10</sup>. Secondly, food banks give everybody the same things, but people don't always need the same things. It is better if they can choose what they need. Thirdly, the store is more visual, and they receive a lot more donations than before. They help about 200 families a day and 25% of the people who come in are children. The majority of people who use a food bank have a job,

but they can't always afford to go to a regular shop. They only visit the food bank sometimes, when they are having difficulty. That is why they are vital<sup>11</sup>. Food banks are a safety net<sup>12</sup>.






### World record

## **An Unusual Job**

#### Waterslide tester

Have you ever been to Gateau Kingdom? They have a great waterslide there, although it is quite short. The world's longest waterslide is in Penang, Malaysia, and it is 1,140 m long!! It takes about 4 minutes to slide! I would love to ride that! What about you? Well, if you decide to do this week's job, you might be able to. This week, I am looking at the job of waterslide tester. New waterslides are built all the time. A company designs and installs<sup>4</sup> them, but how do they know if the slide is good? Maybe it is too steep<sup>5</sup>? Maybe it has too many sharp turns<sup>6</sup>? Maybe it doesn't have enough water. Maybe it has too much water? Maybe it is too slow? How can the company find out all of these things? Well, they can hire a professional waterslide tester. These people travel to new waterslides and ride them many times before they are opened to the public. Then they write a report about the waterslide, so the company know if it is ok. If their report is bad, the company will have to redo<sup>7</sup> the slide. Waterslide testers get paid about 3,000 yen an hour. I expect that most people do it for fun, more than for the money.
