# Something you didn't know about Ichiro's statistics<sup>1</sup>

- 1. Ichiro had 4,367 hits in his professional career, which is more than any other player in baseball history.
- 2. He has the record for the most hits in a single season, 242.
- 3. Ichiro stole 500 bases in his career, and he has a stolen base success rate<sup>2</sup> of 81.3%.
- 4. He kept his batting average<sup>3</sup> over .300 for his entire<sup>4</sup> career, which is rare<sup>5</sup>. In 2004, he batted .372 for the season, which is one of the highest.
- 5. He had ten consecutive<sup>6</sup> seasons of 200+ hits.
- 6. Ichiro didn't start in the MLB until he was 27, having had a long career in Japan first. This made him the oldest player to get a first hit in MLB history.

### **Ichiro Suzuki Enters Hall of Fame**

These days, all people who watch baseball talk about is Otani Shohei. However, before him, there were other Japanese baseball players that kicked up a storm<sup>7</sup> in the MLB. The most successful of those was, obviously, Ichiro Suzuki. In fact, he is so famous, that he simply goes by Ichiro. Well, last week, he was recognized by the MLB and voted into the Hall of Fame<sup>8</sup>. Every year, many players are nominated<sup>9</sup> for the Hall of Fame, and they have to be voted for by all of the members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. These are all of the journalists that write about baseball and they are all very knowledgeable<sup>10</sup> on the subject. The players that get more than 75% of the vote are admitted to the Hall of Fame. Some people are nominated for many years before they get enough votes. This was the first year that Ichiro was nominated and he got 393 out of 394 votes! Everybody wants to know who didn't vote for him. Only one player in the history of the Hall of Fame, Mariano Rivera, has been elected with a unanimous vote<sup>11</sup>. Some people are angry that Ichiro didn't get 100% of the votes because he was such an incredible and game changing player. However, Ichiro doesn't seem to mind. He laughed about it at a press conference. He said that he would like to know who didn't vote for him and invite them for tea.

### World record

I like this new system of trying to keep the same theme through my whole English News. Let's try to find some baseball world records this week. The fastest baseball pitch was 170.3 km/h by Aroldis Chapman. He has 9 of the top 10 fastest pitches and they are all over 169 km/h. The longest baseball throw was 136 m by Glen Gorbous in 1957. It has never been beaten. The longest home run in baseball history was 175 m by Babe Ruth in 1921. That has also never been beaten because baseball bats and balls were changed in the 1930s making it much harder to hit them very far. The most home runs in a season and the most home runs in a career are both held by Barry Bonds. He scored 73 home runs in 2001 and 762 home runs in his career. The most expensive baseball was Shohei Otani's 50<sup>th</sup> home run ball. It was sold for 690,000,000 yen!
